I. DRUMBEATS

IASSH successfully completed fifth National conferences with the blessings of Lord Puri Jagannath. The theme of the conference was “Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) & Health” organised by Centre for Healthcare Management, Xavier Institute of Management, Bhubaneswar, Orissa. The Chief Guest for the inauguration of the conference was Shri. Nesim Tumkaya, UNFPA Representative. The conference was started with the welcome address by Prof.S.Peppin, K.E.Vaidyanthan, gave introduction speech to the conference bring out the interrelationships between Social Science and Health followed by presidential address by Prof.P.K.B.Nayar, special address by Mr. Shadrack Omol, UNICEF Representative for the State of Orissa; and Inaugural address by Fr. P.T. Joseph. S.J., Director, XIMB. Prof. W.S. William, Dean, XIMB; Fr. E.A. Augustine, S.J., Dean (Admn. & Fin), XIMB extended vote of thanks.



This conference made an attempt to bring participants from various institutions to share their views on how to achieve health related goals to promote development because Health being an important indicator of social development. In all 120 abstracts were submitted and attended by around 150 scientists, researchers and program personals.

Fifth conference has identified three themes for the symposia a) MDGs for Health Development, b) Health sector reforms, c) Managerial challenges in Healthcare. Public Private Partnership (MDGs themes: 8), 7. Healthcare financing (MDGs themes: 1, 3, 4, 5&6) 8. Health system performance-1 (MDGs themes: 3, 4, 5 &8), 9. Ethics and quality in Healthcare (MDGs theme: 8), 10. Health system performance-2 (MDGs themes: 3, 4, 5 &8), 10. Corporate Social responsibility for health care (MDGs themes: 3, 4, &5) and 11. Health system performance-1 (MDGs themes: 3, 4, 5 &8).

Centre for AIDS Rehabilitation and Education (CARE) in Madurai, is currently working with around 4000 persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLHAs).Dr. Rajaratnam Abel, who is associated with CARE, published a research article in Lancet:

The major findings of the study are:

- a. Deaths due to HIV/AIDS have dramatically come down including those who are terminally ill.
- b. Stigma has significantly come down with the support and confidence given by the families to cope up with the illness.
- c. This acceptance has ensured that many get better food in the home increasing their immunity.
- d. The counseling provided has given a positive outlook in life for many PLHAs.
- e. Since the CD4 count is an important criterion for starting ART, almost all of them are aware of their CD4 counts. Those whose CD4 counts are high enough to postpone starting ART are confident that they will get the drugs if necessary.
- f. Positive outlook by the families and community has brought out a change among people living with HIV/AIDS.

Apparently the silver lining on the HIV/AIDS problem is beginning to be visible at last.

(b) Book Review:

1. "**HIV and AIDS Vulnerability of Women in Asia and Africa**", edited by **Kiran Prasad and U.V.Somayajulu, the Women Press, Bhamashah Marg, Delhi-110009**, 2008, Rs. 995, contact: brpc@vsnl.com

This book focuses on the vulnerability of women in Asia and Africa to HIV/AIDS from various forces such as the wider social, cultural, economic and political factors. It takes a hard look at the risks of HIV/AIDS that affect women directly or indirectly through poverty, lack of education and livelihood opportunities, inhuman traditions, low social status, poor health care and lack of control over sexual relationships.

This book has eleven chapters with the first chapter providing an overview of the women's vulnerability to HIV/AIDS in Asia and Africa. Chapter 2 to 5 discuss the vulnerability of women from India including rural and urban women, women in sex work, unmarried female college students and married women. Chapter 6 discusses about HIV prevention among Pakistani youth through behaviour change communication, while chapter 7 examines the relationship between sexually transmitted infections and HIV/AIDS vulnerability in Bangladesh. In chapter 8, analysis of media response to AIDS vulnerability in China is presented while chapter 9 presents the vulnerability of Indonesian women to HIV/AIDS. Chapter 10 presents gender perspectives on incidence and prevalence of HIV/AIDS in Sub Saharan Africa. The last chapter lists out the key policy implications and future directions in the light of the results discussed in the preceding chapters.

The studies presented here on sexual behaviour, knowledge of AIDS, attitudes and behaviour change communication point to actions that can be strengthened and stepped up to arrest the spread of the epidemic. The findings documented here have important implications for prevention, treatment and care of women infected by HIV/AIDS. They also provide insight into factors related to sexual behaviour across gender, age groups and populations. The book will also provoke fresh debates on educational and communication strategies addressing the vulnerability of women on HIV/AIDS. 2. “Sexuality and Sexual Behaviour among Unmarried Young Boys: A Study in Rural and Urban Settings of Tamil Nadu” Monograph May 2008, Bharathiar University, Coimbatore for further details contact: audi_bu@yahoo.co.in Rs.150/-

This book is an outcome of an empirical study carried out among 2000 unmarried young boys (15-24 years) belongs to Rural and Urban settings of Coimbatore and Erode districts of Tamil Nadu. The focus was on the prevalence of pre-marital sexual behaviour and its determinants among young boys, their knowledge about various aspects of sexuality, gender-specific attitudes about the pre-marital sex and related issues and gender-specific myths and misconceptions related to pre-marital sex. The findings would be useful for evolving educational strategies for improving the sexual health of the young boys and making policy formulations by health, youth and social welfare departments and for academicians and researchers engaged in sexuality and related issues including HIV/AIDS.

Gujarat Pogrom-2002 is a detailed study of the genocide in Gujarat. Information for this book has been collected from media reports in dailies, magazines, journals, action research report and interview with the people. Gujarat Pogrom-2002 was not spontaneous. It was a result of a decade long preparation of *Hindutva* dream. This book highlight the state sponsored and supported massacre of minorities and participation of tribal in communal riots in a big way. Author argues that the involvement of political parties who are supporting *Hindutva* is the main cause for genocide in tribal dominating districts in Gujarat. This is one of the few books which bring out social conflicts based on caste and religion in backward districts of Gujarat where political parties made use for their leadership positions. Gujarat Pogrom-2002 raises a fundamental question that “has every citizen of India a constitutional right to live or this fundamental right to life is at the whims and mercy of other minority/majority group”.
