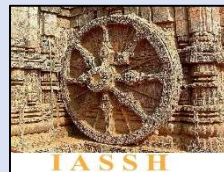

## About IASSH:

The primary objectives of IASSH are to bring together scientists, research scholars, practitioners, and policymakers from various disciplines in one forum to explore and work in the areas of social and cultural dimensions of illness, health and health care in the country. 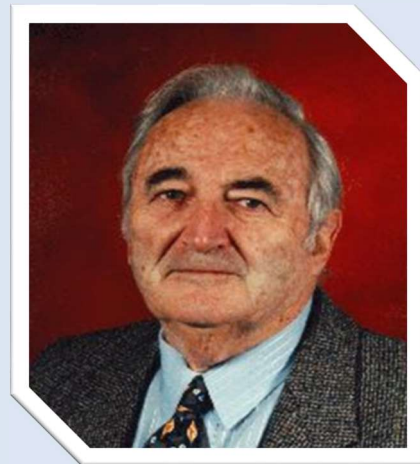


**Inaugural Session of the IASSH Conference 2024 at Pondicherry University**

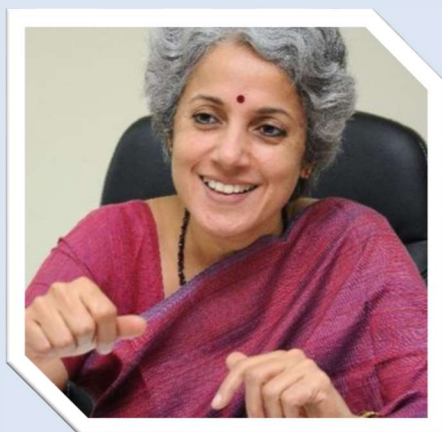


## Seventh Prof. John Caldwell Memorial Lecture

The Doyen of Demography, **Prof. John Charles (Jack) Caldwell**, died on 12th March 2016 at the age of 87 in Canberra. He was associated with the Department of Demography of the Australian National University (ANU) for many decades. Caldwell's seminal work included documentation of the role of mother's education in fertility limitation and child mortality decline and the role of circumcision in inhibiting the spread of HIV/AIDS in Africa. He is known for his



“wealth flows” theory, which relates demographic transition theory to changes in intergenerational transfers within the family. He has encouraged and mentored many young scholars from India, and a good number of them received their Ph. Ds from ANU under his able guidance. His anthropological demographic work on South India, particularly on marriage, fertility and contraception, received much research attention. At Prof. K.N.M. Raju's initiative, his students, colleagues, and friends approached the Indian Association for Social Sciences and Health (IASSH) to institute a memorial lecture in his honour. Considering this request, the IASSH instituted the lecture series in memory of the most famous demographer of our times.

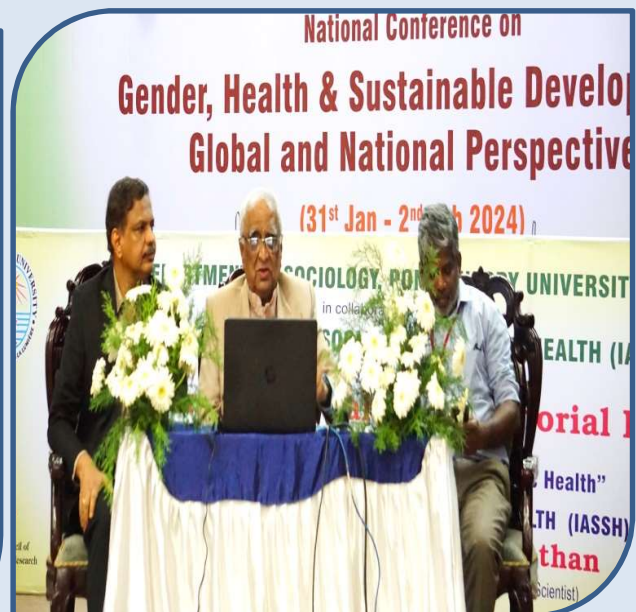


The Seventh Prof. John Caldwell Memorial Lecture was held at the **Convention-cum-Cultural Centre** of Pondicherry University at **12:00 PM** on **January 31st, 2024**. **Prof. K. Srinivasan** (former Director of IIPS, and IUSSP Laureate) chaired the session. The session began with an introduction by Prof. T. V. Sekher about the life and works of Prof. John Caldwell, a renowned demographer who contributed significantly to the field of demography. The guest speaker was **Dr. Soumya**

**Swaminathan** (Chairperson of Dr. M. S. Swaminathan Research Foundation, served as WHO's Chief Scientist and Deputy Director-General for Programmes), who delivered the seventh Prof. John Caldwell Memorial Lecture on the theme - ***“Lessons from the Pandemic for Science and Public Health.”***

In her speech, Dr. Swaminathan highlighted key insights from the COVID-19 pandemic and their implications for scientific research and public health practices. She emphasized the importance of global collaboration, data transparency, and rapid response mechanisms in addressing future health crises. She elaborated on how the pandemic highlighted the existing inequalities worldwide. Dr. Swaminathan discussed the role of scientific innovation in vaccine development and the need for equitable distribution to ensure widespread protection against infectious diseases. She emphasized the significance of evidence-based decision-making and effective communication strategies in fostering public trust and adherence to public health measures. Furthermore, Dr. Swaminathan addressed challenges such as misinformation, vaccine hesitancy, and health inequalities, calling for concerted efforts to address systemic issues to promote health equity worldwide.

At the end of the lecture, **Dr. V. Selvaraju** (Vice President, IASSH) proposed a vote of thanks, expressing gratitude to the guest speaker, the chairperson, and the audience for their active participation and contribution to the event. Overall, the lecture provided valuable insights into the lessons learned from the pandemic and emphasized the critical role of science and public health in safeguarding global well-being.

## 9th Prof. K. E. Vaidyanathan Memorial Lecture

IASSH has instituted a memorial lecture in honour of **Prof. K.E. Vaidyanathan** since 2014. He was the President of the Indian Association for Social Sciences and Health (IASSH) from 2007 to 2011 and was mainly responsible for the expansion of the Association to its present form. Dr. Vaidyanathan was a distinguished demographer who served in various capacities in the United Nations and other organizations. He started his career as a faculty at the International Institute for Population Sciences in Mumbai.



He later became the Head of the Department of Population Studies at the Institute of Rural Health and Family Planning in Gandhigram. He then joined the UN system and worked in various countries such as Egypt, Syria, Uganda, and Sudan, where he helped establish centers for population studies and research, advised planning commissions and conducted successful population surveys and censuses. In his later years, he also helped plan and implement the Living Standards Measurement Survey in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Dr. Vaidyanathan passed away in 2014 in Bangalore.



The 9<sup>th</sup> Dr. K. E. Vaidyanathan Memorial Lecture was held at the J N Auditorium on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of February 2024. The session was chaired by **Prof. B. B. Mohanty**, Dean of the School of Social Science & International Studies at Pondicherry University and co-chaired by Prof. S. Siva Raju (Former President of IASSH). Prof. T. V. Sekher spoke about the life and contributions of Prof. Vaidyanathan. The speaker for the event was **Dr. Manju Rahi**, a clinician by training, Scientist-'G' and Director at ICMR - Vector Control Research Centre, Pondicherry.

Who delivered the 9th Prof. K. E. Vaidyanathan Memorial Lecture on the topic, ***“Gendering of Health Outcomes: The Case of Vector-Borne Diseases.”***

Dr. Manju Rahi began by highlighting the significance of understanding gender dynamics in the context of health outcomes, particularly concerning vector-borne diseases. She emphasized that while vector-borne diseases affect everyone, they often manifest differently based on gender, socio-economic factors, and cultural norms. Dr. Rahi presented compelling data and case studies demonstrating the differential impact of vector-borne diseases on men and women. She discussed how societal roles, access to healthcare, and exposure to vectors influence the vulnerability of individuals, with women often bearing a disproportionate burden due to their roles in caregiving and domestic work. In conclusion, she emphasized the need for gender-sensitive approaches in research, policy-making, and public health interventions to address these inequalities effectively.

Overall, the 9th Prof. K. E. Vaidyanathan Memorial Lecture provided valuable insights into the gender dimensions of health outcomes related to vector-borne diseases, emphasizing upon further research and action in this critical area. The lecture was followed by a vote of thanks by **Dr. Pragya Tiwari Gupta**, who expressed her gratitude to all the speakers and participants for their valuable contributions.

## IASSH-Best Publication Awards for Young Researchers

To encourage academic scholarship and quality scientific publications in social sciences and health studies, IASSH invited applications from young researchers to submit their recent journal publications for consideration for the Best Publication Awards. Based on our announcement in Aug. 2023 for the best publication awards, we received 31 applications. A screening committee first scrutinized the applications for the eligibility criteria like age (below 35 years), year of publication (2022), single/first author of the paper, etc., and shortlisted 22 papers for the assessment of the Selection Committee. The Selection Committee, consisting of four experts, reviewed the shortlisted papers and recommended three young researchers for the award. Though, it was a difficult choice to select three from many high-quality publications in reputed journals. The winners received a Certificate and a cash prize of Rs. 25,000 each, which was presented to them by Prof. K. Srinivasan during the conference.

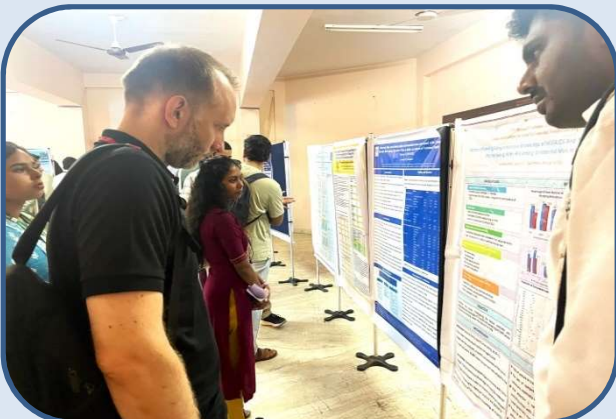

In order to train young research scholars, IASSH has initiated the Pre-Conference Workshop from 2010 onwards. Topics Covered in the Pre-Conference Workshop are to provide hands-on training in the applications of ATLAS.ti and NVivo software in qualitative research. This covers transcription of qualitative data; Analysis of Qualitative Data coding, memos, and relationships; Data Management using ATLAS.ti and NVivo software; Reporting and presenting qualitative findings. Forty-five young researchers participated in the workshop. They gave the feedback that the workshop helped fine-tune their research skills. The participants were given certificates after completion of 2 days of intensive training. **Resource Persons:** 1) **Dr. B.
